John Fernandez

President and CEO, Lifespan

As president and CEO, John Fernandez leads Lifespan, a not-for-profit comprehensive, integrated, academic health system that cares for more than 550,000 people each year. Lifespan is affiliated with The Warren Alpert Medical School of Brown University, and includes Rhode Island Hospital and its pediatric division, Hasbro Children's Hospital; The Miriam Hospital; Bradley Hospital; Newport Hospital; Gateway Healthcare; Lifespan Physician Group, the largest multi-specialty practice in Rhode Island; and Coastal Medical, a primary care driven medical practice.

Prior to joining Lifespan, Fernandez served as president of two organizations that are part of the Mass General Brigham healthcare system. From 2007 to 2022, Fernandez was president of Mass Eye and Ear, one of the nation's largest specialty hospitals exclusively dedicated to academic research, training and treatment for conditions that impair vision, hearing and other disorders of the eyes, ears, nose, throat, head, and neck. Fernandez also served as President of Mass General Brigham Integrated Care; a Mass General Brigham entity formed in 2019 with a mission to bring lower cost health care closer to where patients live.

Throughout his career, Fernandez has a demonstrated track record of increasing and improving healthcare services, investing in research and innovation, and training the next generation of health professionals. Recently, he led key strategic initiatives for Mass General Brigham to provide greater access to ambulatory services in Massachusetts, New Hampshire, and other states, including the design, planning, and opening of a multi-specialty ambulatory care and surgical center in Salem, NH.

Prior to his Mass Eye and Ear appointment, Fernandez served as vice president at Brigham and Women's Hospital for several areas including surgical services, imaging, cancer, pathology, laboratory, and network development.

Fernandez received a bachelor's degree in political science from The College of Wooster in Ohio and a master's degree in government administration from the University of Pennsylvania.

Over the past 9 years, Feyisitan worked in various leadership positions for Community Action Partnership of Providence County including Director of Operations, Deputy Director, and his most recent position as CAPP's President and CEO. His vision and resolve were instrumental in enhancing the development of CAPP's short- and long-term organizational objectives as well as cultivating partnerships with community- based and government leaders to affect change and opportunities for individuals and families in Providence and surrounding communities.

Prior to working for CAPP, Feyisitan was the Chief Administrator for the Rhode Island Department of Health's Office of Minority Health. In this position, he provided guidance and support to RIDOH's goal of eliminating racial and ethnic health disparities and advancing economic, education, social and political equity. Feyisitan also supervised and coordinated RIDOH's Minority Health Promotion Programs, Refugee Health Program, Federal CLAS Mandate Coordination & Language Access, and Emergency Preparedness for Vulnerable Populations.

Dr. Michael Wagner has built his career and reputation on being a leader who combines his unique experience as a physician, entrepreneur, and healthcare executive to transform health care. Dr. Wagner most recently served as Chief Physician Executive (CPE) for Tufts Medicine, a \$2.2B leading integrated health system. During his tenure, Tufts MC achieved a strong financial performance and was twice recognized with a Five Star rating on the Vizient (University Health System Consortium) annual quality and effectiveness evaluation – the only AMC in New England to achieve this recognition.

In addition to his experience leading a complex health system, Dr. Wagner's deep and varied experiences include managing a national physician practice management company, leading an academic division of general medicine and graduate medical education, and has held governance roles on non-profit and for-profit boards.

A magna cum laude graduate of Connecticut College and a graduate of Georgetown University School of Medicine, Dr. Wagner completed his residency and chief residency in Internal Medicine at Dartmouth in Hanover, NH.

My name is Silvia Adames; I was born in Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic. I graduated from the Faculty of Economics and Social Science with a bachelor's degree in accounting. I immigrated to the United States 18 years ago with my three daughters and husband. I started my career in the US by working in a factory. After a year, I began training as a Homemaker for seniors while seeking to further my professional career. I later began training as a CNA, where I found my passion for working with the geriatric population. Five years later, I took training as a Medication technician, still serving the elderly population. Unfortunately, a shoulder injury made it difficult to perform my job duties as a CNA. After my injury, I began looking for new career opportunities. That is when I heard about a program that trained people to become community health workers. I was blessed to have the opportunity to enhance my career at Blackstone Valley Community Health Care, where I continued working with vulnerable populations. Thanks to the Rhode Island Health Professional Equity Initiative, part of RI Reconnect, I'm currently enrolled in the MSW program at Rhode Island College. This program will allow me to obtain my master's in social work and help more vulnerable communities.

Evelyn Pinto de Duran, RN, BSN

President, CEO & Founder, Your Choice of Home Care

My name is Evelyn Pinto de Duran, I have had the privilege of working as nurse and an CNA educator for the past 15 years, My journey started back in my country; Guatemala, my father was assassinated during a Civil War when I was seven years old, prompting a 10 year separation from my mother as she immigrated to the United States in search of the American Dream; I arrived to this country at age 17 eager to reach the American Dream.

Since I remember my dream was to be a nurse, I remember as a child helping the poor and underserved members of my community, becoming a nurse seemed impossible, as I was a non-English speaking, undocumented young girl. As most immigrants, I began working in a factory. After six months of this grueling work, I made the decision to take the CNA class. I successfully completed this class and spent the next 5 years working in this profession, my first step to my dream. Nothing gives me more satisfaction than taking care of my patients, but when I dig into my childhood memories, I have no doubt I was born to become a nurse.

In Guatemala, I was a 15-year-old girl with a child that had no chance to an education. I was not allowed to go to school with the rest of the kids around my age because I was a bad example to them. That quickly changed when I arrived to this country. I had an opportunity but I had to overcome all the obstacles. Everyone around me made me feel unsuccessful and discouraged,

all I heard was "you can't do it, you don't speak English". The language barrier was a limitation that interfered with my academic performance and self-esteem.

I was surrounded by caring adults that believed in me; they helped me to see past the moment and focus on the future; they knew that Language acquisition was only a temporary obstacle. Learning about others' experiences and success stories was empowering, it brought so much hope into my life, making the impossible seem possible.

I learned some English and continue to learn daily, did my GED and I started my journey at CCRI for the nursing program in 1999; in 2006 I graduated as an RN and completed my BSN in 2018. I feel inspired by my mother, coming from a 3rd world country where it is often common that females have limited access to education; my grandmother never went to school and my mother only completed second grade. I am grateful to have learned English, completed my GED and college. I am filled with joy for the privilege of caring and educating others.

My Nursing Career has been in Psych Nursing and Home Care. Many of these years have proudly taken the role of nursing director as well as an educator of paraprofessionals, such as CNAs and Phlebotomists at Your Choice of CNA Training Program. Now I am the founder of Your Choice of Home Care, which opened in January 2020.
